
## Enterprise Challenge

JJ introduced himself by saying his job was “to run and jump in the sand; who wouldn’t want such a job!”


In an earlier assembly, in preparation for this visit, **Mrs Baird** and **Mr Campbell** had used a tape measure to show the whole school just how far his personal best jump of 8m 4cm stretched. We were all very impressed, especially with his jump over 3 Mini cars when they were re-launched.

JJ told us that in order to make the cut for the 2012 Olympics he would need to jump 8m 45cms, so has still some way to go. We all wish him luck with that and look forward to cheering him on to a gold medal.

He inspired the pupils by explaining how he wasn’t particularly good at the long jump when he first started but was determined to succeed so worked hard at it. He is currently training in Gateshead and will be back at Solway school in the new year.



JJ has a degree in Banking & Finance but wanted to concentrate on athletics as he had found it was something he could do well. He enjoyed a reading lesson with Yr 7s as well as a tour around school and a Q & A session with the Yr 10 GCSE PE pupils in the Sports Hall.



## Year 11 - AQ

This term has been really busy for Yr 11. They have had a Maths GCSE on 9 November, Science resits on 26 November and mock exams in most subjects. Some subjects have also been carrying out Controlled Assignments; Spanish, History and English and there are more of them to come. BACS Controlled Assignment is being held on 2 sessions on 18 and 19 of January from 1pm - 5pm. A Science GCSE is in January and Controlled Assignments are taking place in other subject areas.

The results of the mocks will be available to the pupils after Christmas, when we hold our mock Results day, to emulate the August event in preparation for the real thing!

Please check your child's planner to see what their homework is and sign it. Encourage them to do some homework or revision every night as they will always have some set. This will make the final push in May and June much easier.

The next big date for parents of Year 11 is the Careers Destination Evening on 25 January at 6.30. Not only will staff be available to speak to but Post 16 providers will also be in school. There will be staff from all the 6th forms and colleges, training agencies and **Innovia** for you to seek advice from. Andy Wallam, the Connexions Personal Advisor will also be here should you need to speak to him. All Year 11 pupils will have had their first interview with him by then and he will be aware of the aspirations of your child.

## English Stars

Some of our top Yr 7 English pupils took part in pilot tests for the NFER (National Foundation for Educational Research) this week.

Currently the KS2 SATs test pupils up to Level 5 but the Government is thinking about introducing tests that go up to Level 6 so that the brightest pupils are challenged. These tests are being piloted with selected Yr 7 pupils throughout the country.

The pupils must have achieved excellent results in reading in their KS2 SATs.

We were delighted that **Macy Baker, Shane Boydell, Maddie Yarnold, Billy Harrison, Natalie Whitfield, Emily Smith, Ben Goodman and Calum Spence** were able to take part in these tests.

## Chair of Governors

My name is Denise Scott, I have been a governor at Solway for eighteen years and chair of governors for four years. I am linked to the English department and follow their plans closely, meeting regularly with Mrs Scholey and feeding back to the Governing Body. I also have responsibility for Child Protection and along with Mrs Baird have responsibility for the appointment of staff. I am a member of the Finance committee and chair of the Pupils and Parents committee, whose focus is the wellbeing of the pupils.

Governors have devoted a lot of time to ensuring policies and procedures are in place in school, that they are regularly reviewed by the committees and followed by staff. The main focus of the Governing body has been to ensure our staff deliver high standards of education. The Governors have regular presentations from staff and work closely with the Head ensuring we are well informed and able to make informed decisions.



## Netball

The first half of the season has been very successful. We have played St Josephs, St Benedict's, Whitehaven, West Lakes Academy and Stainburn. The yr7 team is making progress and beginning to find some patterns in their play. The yr8 team has made huge progress this term and has already won 3 matches, last year they won only 1! In yr9 we have a strong team of determined girls who have progressed incredibly well. They have won all their matches in the league so far this season and in the Copeland and Allerdale tournament they were runners up. This qualified them to go through to the County finals against the other district finalist. Although not winning all their games they acquitted themselves really well and I was extremely proud of them.

The senior girls continue to produce a high standard of play and have yet to drop a match! However we still have very stiff opponents to face and they will have to be really focussed to continue their run.

Several girls are getting extra practice after school on a Monday 3-4pm and have shown a marked improvement. There is also the Ladies netball training session on Thursdays from 6.30 to 7.30 for all yr9 and over. These sessions are enormously beneficial and open to all levels. The girls who attend gain confidence, practice some advanced skills and get to play with adults. The cost of this is £1.50 and is a great way of getting fit and improving skills.

## Rugby



## Awards Evening

It was such a lovely evening; the stage looked wonderful thanks to the **First Responders'** backdrop and **Mr Gilmour's** lights, the Christmas tree had arrived earlier in the day and had been decorated beautifully by the Yr 11s as part of their GCSE Hospitality & Catering coursework preparation for the forthcoming banquet, the trophies gleamed in the twinkling fairy lights, thanks to **Mr Tatlock** and the certificates and prizes were all ready for distribution, thanks to **Mrs Wise, Mrs Long and Mrs Tallontire**, guests, pupils, parents and family were seated in anticipation. **Mrs Baird** made the opening address, explaining how this was one of the best evenings in the school calendar, where staff rewarded those pupils who had achieved due to their hard work throughout the previous year. She went on to thank the staff for their hard work and dedication, the pupils for 66% achieving 5 GCSEs at A\* to C, and to the community for their support. She explained the recent English survey Ofsted inspection, which took place just before half term, had produced their report which confirmed that Solway was a 'Good' school. The school had been as busy as ever, raising money for various charities, Breast Cancer, Children in Need, Samaritan's Purse, RNLI, taking part in sporting events and welcoming in **JJ Jegede** the Olympic long jump hopeful and coping with boilers which were well past their sell by date. The good news, which she had received, only that afternoon was that the local authority was not only going to replace the boilers but that the school would receive a whole new heating system. The project is due to start at Easter and to be finished by September 2012. No more will **Mr Wigginton** need to teach in a fridge, no more will pupils need to complain about it being too cold in the Music room, we hope! By zoning the school too, we should be able to save money in the future on heating bills; the Library and the Nursery will be able to run their heating independently of the rest of the school. The bill, which could be as much as £300,000 will be paid for by the LA. Great news!

Our Guest of Honour for the evening was **Samantha Parker**, the West Cumbria reporter for ITV Border. She is no stranger to the school, having reported on our Catering team winning their national award in 2010 and has a connection with our English department. She explained how she had been shocked by her mock GCSE grades when she was at school which had given her the push she needed to achieve well in the real event and at A level before moving on to University. This is exactly the message our current Year 11s need as they are taking their mocks this week. It was fitting too that our Year 11s from last year were able to hear how everyone encounters difficulties of some description on the way and strives to overcome them to achieve their goal.

Pupils from current Year 8 to Year 11 received their cups, trophies, vouchers, certificates and with each was a citation explaining the reasons for the award; something I hope which will be treasured for their own children to see in the future. Guests then were able to mingle while enjoying seasonal refreshments thanks to **Mrs Hoodless** and **Mrs Caulfield**.

Current and ex pupils receive their prizes and certificates from **Samantha Parker**, West Cumbria Reporter for ITV Border .




**A**irline Day 2011

## Dear JJ Jegede

JJ Jegede is the second best in the United Kingdom for long jumping. It was exciting for him to come into our school and tell us about his life story and his sports life. JJ Jegede was 1 month old when his father left his mum, him and his 3 sisters. His mum had 3 jobs so she could get money to put food on the table for them, and after a while his mum did not have enough money to pay the rent for his house. So they often had bailiffs at their door telling them to move out and find somewhere else. By the time JJ Jegede was 15 he had moved houses 20 times. Now he is living in Gateshead where he is doing his training. JJ Jegede trains Monday – Saturday every week and he trains 4 – 5 hours on Monday, 6 – 7 hours on a Tuesday, 4 – 5 hours on Wednesday, 6 – 8 hours on a Thursday, 4 hours on a Friday and 3 hours on a Saturday. JJ Jegede went to a primary school in Hackney called Morningside. He said that it was the worst school in the world and he was a very shy person.

He left primary and went to a secondary school where he had to travel 1 hour every day to school which was tiring for him. In his primary he played table tennis every week and he was always on the lower table. He started to go to table tennis practice every week and after 2 months he was on the top table and he was always there, and by the end of year 7 JJ Jegede was a county champion table tennis player.

I think JJ Jegede was very interesting to listen to about all the success he has had even though he has gone through a lot in life. I am very happy he came in and how lucky we are to have him to come into our school. It has made me think I could have a good success in life if I keep trying and doing things more than once.

## Remembrance Day – AQ


