

ttendance

I know I write about our school attendance in every newsletter but it is such an important part of school. If pupils aren't at school then they don't learn what they need for their chosen subjects. Currently we have 58 pupils on 100% attendance, that's 40% of the school have been here every day so far this year. It's a big improvement on last year when it was only 23% at the same time of the year. That's a really pleasing statistic. We are trying to train them to be employable. We have a target set of 95% attendance over the year. Last year we managed 93.7% and currently we are on 95.7%. Keep up the good work; both parents and pupils as it is a team effort. 11AQ need a special mention, not only are they my form, but they have 97.6% attendance and twice we have had a weekly attendance of 100%! Year 11 – Miss Jones and Mrs Quinn Year 11 have been sitting mock GCSE exams over the last couple of weeks. It's a very difficult and challenging part of their lives as we prepare them for the real exams in May and June. In some subjects they also take Controlled Assignments;

Spanish, BACS, Music, History, RMT, Science, Hospitality, Catering, Health and Social Care. This is coursework by a different name but completed in school and under exam conditions. Even this is a challenge for some. On January 10 the pupils will be given their results in an envelope in order to replicate the situation in August when they receive their all important results that will either enable or prevent them from doing what they want post 16. RMT and Food coursework sessions on Tuesdays and Thursdays

Revision techniques in form time

Colleges and ex pupils in to talk to them (more are planned)

ESH – an organisation in school regularly to inspire them to achieve and show them how to do a good letter, CV and to be aware of what their on-line presence should be like

We have great members of staff who willingly help when pupils ask. If your son or daughter is lacking confidence or needs assistance with a difficult part of the curriculum or homework please encourage them to ask for help. Failing that, write in the planner and ask your child to give it to their form tutor who will see that they get what they need.

We also offer them basketball and netball sessions both during the day and after school so they can unwind with support from the PE staff.

S olway Community Technology College becomes a 'SCHOOL OF DREAMS'!

Honda's 'School of Dreams' team visited Solway Community Technology College to provide a two-day 'thinking skills' workshop for 9-13 year old pupils (key stage 2 & 3) and educators.

The School of Dreams programme helps young people to understand the importance of pursuing their dreams, and teaches skills and strategies to help turn their dreams into reality. It was developed by Honda (UK) and a team of independent education experts as part of Honda's commitment to giving back to the local communities in which it operates. School of Dreams helps pupils and educators discover different, creative and fun ways to learn.

The School of Dreams programme has been carefully mapped against the National Curriculum's Personal Learning and Thinking Skills framework. Over the course of the two days pupils experienced all ten of the learning strategies identified in the 'Leading in Learning' education initiative.

The workshop was challenging but great fun. Teachers and pupils worked at the same level in small groups finding out how to turn their dreams into reality, by learning from real-life examples of people who



have achieved their dreams, as well as developing new skills such as juggling. Over the course of the



two days we did a wide variety of tasks to find out what our strengths were. On the final day we had to give a presentation to parents and members of the community on an issue that we wanted to change. Each group worked really hard on this task and it was wonderful to see every single pupil taking part in the presentation and speaking so confidently in front of others. Overall the two days were absolutely fantastic and staff and

hen shall we three meet again..." The opening lines from Shakespeare's *Macbeth*, immediately recognisable and instantly mesmerising – and recently pronounced by pupil-witches from Solway Community Technology College at the Theatre by the Lake in Keswick. The school was taking part in the largest youth theatre festival in the UK – Shakespeare Schools' Festival – and put on a fabulous performance of Macbeth to a packed house.

Pupils aged 11 - 16 were involved, none of whom had any previous acting experience, yet they showed themselves to be not only hardworking and determined but also talented actors, delivering an outstanding version of the Scottish play. Speaking to the cast after the performance, the professional Shakespearean director from SSF said the production was innovative, creepy and atmospheric - and it was delivered with conviction and confidence. It was a beautiful example of ensemble storytelling, and a visual treat. The pupils put on a brilliant performance and will never forget how it felt to stand on that stage and hear the applause of the audience. They left the theatre standing a little taller, full of pride in their achievements. The response of the pupils to the language, ideas and themes of Shakespeare was astonishing, proving that Shakespeare is not only accessible to 21st century pupils, but something they have the confidence to make their own. The production starred Tyler Cook, aged 12 as Macbeth, Katie Swan as Lady Macbeth and Lucy Winter, Ellie Scott and Hannah Gilmour as the three manipulative, malicious witches, who, along with the other cast members are already looking forward to their next Shakespearean challenge in 2014 - the 450th anniversary of Shakespeare's birth - along with 35,000 other young people in 1500 schools across the UK.

n Inspector Calls Theatre Trip

A group of Year 10 and 11 pupils enjoyed a trip to Theatre by the Lake in Keswick last month to see the play we are studying for GCSE English Literature.

Set in 1912, it tells the story of a rich family, the Birlings, who are visited by an inspector who wishes to investigate their part in the death of a young woman. As he begins to question them one by one, it becomes clear that they are all involved in some way.

J B Priestley, the playwright, took the murder mystery idea and turned it on its head to surprise and challenge the beliefs of his original audience, but as the play has been around since 1945, the danger is that any production can seem a little old fashioned. There certainly wasn't any chance of that with the production we saw: The script was true to the original, but the staging and the inclusion of a ghostly figure of the young woman made the ideas crystal clear and gave it the supernatural element hinted at by Priestley.



Those who went found it very dramatic; one even said it was better than the RSC production we went to in Newcastle two days later!






The EduVoice scheme

Yet more amazing is that even though they don't have any, or good enough, privacy settings, they often still post inappropriate images of themselves. Do you know what your child does on Facebook or Twitter? If you ask to see their profile and they won't show you, would that ring alarm bells? I looked at one pupil's profile recently to find they had 1300 followers, most of them foreign, older men. Please check what your child is doing on-line. Remember, it is illegal to use foul or abusive language and to post and store inappropriate images.


