**S**illoth Media Reporters with VIPs involved in Green Opening Event



## Silloth Media Reporters supporting use of the Green

As almost everyone in Silloth will know, the opening event of the Green on 20<sup>th</sup> May saw the unveiling of the newly restored Pagoda and Edwardian toilets in addition to an events area, a water and woodland adventure play area.

Families turned out in their droves to enjoy the sunshine and additional entertainment on the Green, including a Punch and Judy show, bouncy castle, fairground rides and face painting. Pupils wearing **SillothMedia** t-shirts took the role of community reporters. Their job was to take photos at the open event and interview people to find out what they thought of the Green.

As the photos show, all the reporters did a fantastic job at the opening event, capturing the mood of the day and bringing back some great shots – likely to become future memories - as well as useful information about the Green from some of the people attending. The reporters will also be involved in the proposed £15,000 BMX Track consultation, which has several different phases, including:

- an open consultation evening on Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> May in the Community hall;

- ongoing consultation with other young people in youth clubs, the scouts and in schools to see what they want to see in a new track

The findings of the BMX consultation will feed into a report for Heritage Lottery Fund. If they approve and feel the consultation has been carried out in a robust enough way, they are more likely to release the funding to proceed with building a BMX Track appropriate to Silloth needs.

All the photos and the comments will be uploaded eventually to a newly purchased website [www.sillothmedia.co.uk](http://www.sillothmedia.co.uk). The website hasn't been set up as yet - but the hope is for people to work together - perhaps interested pupils and even staff with the right skills plus interested members of the public in Silloth, to put something memorable and useful together. Social media can be used to set up interactive pages for local people and visitors to post comments and provide feedback about the Green; also a blog and Facebook pages to feature planned events and document what is happening on the Green. Social media can also be used to promote the Green far and wide and we'd like to set up Flickr and YouTube accounts so that photos and videos can be uploaded to the site.

Any pupil (besides those already interested) who would like to take on the role of community reporter at future events or in helping create the new Silloth Media website, please get in touch with Mrs Baird, who can then liaise with Anna Malina, the Community Engagement Officer for Silloth Green. It may also be an idea for pupils to ask parents with the right skills to get involved.

The website could also be used to help keep the Green in good use. People are very lucky to have had such an enormous amount of money spent on making it so attractive. There are a few problems that still have to be overcome but these are being reported and will be dealt with. In addition, one danger is that some young people are riding their bikes down the track from the pagoda, which is putting them and smaller children who are walking back and forth from the water play to the picnic tables at risk. It might be that some of the youngsters aren't aware enough of the dangers, but they need to think about the consequences and stop riding their bikes in that area.

None of you should forget how important it is to look after the Green, so that all the facilities will be available for use not only by you but your younger brothers and sisters and even your children one day!





## Olympic Heads or Tales: Book a Winner for Local Author?



In this year of the London Olympics, young and old alike are excited by the romance and the endeavour, the sweat and the tears of the greatest sporting event ever devised.

On page 1 of this book, we are in Athens, at the Panathenaic Stadium. In 432 BC, Themis quarrels with a fellow pupil after a training session. They race their ponies down the valley and Themis is thrown at the bridge. He hits his head on the stone abutment. The priestess invokes the god Apollo to call back the soul of Themis, who is lying as if dead.

In 2010 AD, Suzanne from Penrith is on a school trip to Athens. She is separated from her classmates at a pedestrian crossing as they leave the stadium. This is the exact same place where the bridge stood 2,400 years ago. Suzanne, upset by a text from her boy friend dumping her, starts to cross the road. She is hit by a speeding motorbike.

Themis wakes, but has no memory. Suzanne is unconscious, lying as if dead.

Will his destiny be death or glory at Olympia? Will she recover or will her mind be forever occupied by the past?

This fresh and fast paced time-slip novel is set in Ancient Greece and present day Cumbria. With its themes of striving for excellence, self knowledge, and the conflict between family duty and self realisation it will appeal not just to young adults but to everyone who remembers what it is to be young and ambitious.

Julia Newsome, who lives in West Cumbria, is the award winning author of two Cambridge University Press English Readers. She has lived in and written about many countries, but in writing her first full length novel, *The Boy with Two Heads*, she has come home in more ways than one.

The present day part of the book is set in and around Penrith, where Julia spent part of her childhood. The rest of the book is set in Greece, where she lived for over twenty years and where her grown-up children still live.

Throughout the writing and rewriting of this wide-ranging book, Julia consulted many people, and especially enjoyed the lively responses of young students in several local schools. She will be visiting local schools again to read and talk about how all of our lives resemble the striving for perfection, the disappointments and triumphs of athletic competitions. All of us want to be the best we can!

"I've always been fascinated by what we still have from 5th Century Ancient Athens", she says. "This story grew out of my researching facets of that period that interest me. I used to teach English to Greek teenagers, so I also drew on their preoccupations and personalities. The ancient Olympics have many similarities with our modern Games but many intriguing differences too."

For this very local book, she chose Wigton based publisher Trifolium Books UK.




## Hockey players of the year

## A Taste of India

On Friday 20<sup>th</sup> April a lady from India called **Mrs Kher** came in to talk to us about what lives were like in the slums of India. She told us about how she had transformed the lives of some of the children there by opening a school. The school she opened wasn't even a school, it was just a rented out house that was the size of room 7 (the technology room) split into four.

The school is still developing and they can't afford furniture so they have to eat on the floor. They put up colourful posters to brighten up the school because they can't afford to decorate it. They only go on school trips once a year because it costs too much to get a bus. Last year they went on a school trip to a play ground and they all enjoyed it.

**Mr Owens** from Allonby Primary school went to India for a teacher exchange to see how life there was different to life here. He taught them English, and it just shows how lazy most of us are as they can speak English and Hindi (their local languages) really well.

The teachers have taught the children general hygiene so they can keep themselves clean. Some children only have one set of clothes, so one child couldn't come into school because it was being washed that day! The school children have been given seven more sets of clothes.

Sadly the school hasn't got enough money to afford to get all the everyday school equipment, such as computers and paint so they cannot be taught ICT or Art!

The children are in school from 8am to 5pm! Because if they don't they might not get fed or someone may steal them from the streets! Mrs Kher thinks of these children as her own. She has a daughter who is 19 that works at the school as well and a 14 year old son who also sometimes helps out.

Both her children went to a school such as Solway and are well educated. In India they have the richest people to the poorest, like the children you have heard about.

Mrs Kher also makes sure that all the children see the nurse and get a check up to make sure they don't have any diseases. If they do happen to have a disease she makes sure they get cured. In India it is very easy to pick up illness, so if you do happen to go over there make sure you get the jabs!

Congratulations to them all - such talent.






## Dunolly Adventures
