

## Internet Safety Day - Mrs Quinn

The 7 February was Internet Safety Day. This year's theme was **Connecting Generations** and given that a lot of our pupils have Android or iPhones it seems appropriate.

- Nearly half the parents (48%) with children aged 5-15 who use the internet at home think they know less about the internet than their children, this rises to 70% of parents of 12-15 year olds
- Three in ten parents of 5-15s (30%) who use the internet at home are very or fairly concerned that their child may be giving out personal details to inappropriate people, with concern increasing with the age of the child
- 77 % of parents of children aged 5-11 and 81 % of parents of children aged 12-17 think that they know what their child does online; however, 33 % of children aged 12-17 claim that their parents do not know what they do online.

There is also great advice about social networking sites.

Below is an excerpt from an article about the use of Facebook.

“Despite an age limit of 13, almost half of British children aged between 9 and 12, are using social networking sites. It has been reported that one in five children in this age bracket has a Facebook page even though rules state that they must be 13. Authors of the report, have suggested that removing the age requirement would make it easier to monitor online behaviour. But the children’s charity Kidscape has criticised the idea.

The research, carried out by the London School of Economics for the European Commission, was based on a survey of 25,000 young people, aged between nine and 16, from across Europe. It asked if they maintained a social networking profile.

In the UK, 43% of 9 to 12-year-olds answered yes, along with 88% of 13 to 16-year-olds.”

Our pupils do not have access to any social networking site in school although most can now access it on their phone. They receive advice on how to behave online from Year 7 to Year 11 but despite that and at least once a week, we have to deal with episodes of online bullying. Used for the reason it was designed it does not create a problem but it can so easily be abused.

## Facebook - Mrs Quinn

We had the benefit of PC Keith Hunter in school on 31 January speaking to every class in school about the use of social network sites as there have been some local incidences of young people being stalked via Facebook. We understand that it is difficult to keep up to date with technology but the fact is that our children do it far better than we do. Given that a lot of pupils have android/iphones, laptops and game stations in their bedroom, do we really know what they are doing? PC Hunter was trying to make them more aware of what potential there is for a predator.

## Chefs' whites

This term has seen the introduction of the “Chefs Whites” for Key stage 4 Hospitality and Catering pupils. This has made quite a difference to the pupils involved; it was so noticeable from the moment that they put the “Whites” on how professional they felt and practical work stepped up a notch with everyone working quietly and efficiently, eager to produce professional products.


